
## Share of 2023 residency programs filled by U.S. fourth-year M.D. students, by specialty

More medical school graduates are steering away from emergency medicine and opting for specialties like orthopedics and plastic surgery, Axios' Arielle Dreher and Tina Reed write for Axios Vitals.

- More than 550 slots for emergency medicine residents were left unfilled this year, according to the <u>National Resident Matching</u> <u>Program</u>, which pairs newly minted doctors with post-graduate opportunities in medical centers.
- That's up from 335 a year ago and a major jump from 2018, when only 13 E.R. openings were unfilled.

**Why it matters:** The field not long ago was one of the most desired for young doctors and <u>celebrated on TV</u>.

**What's happening:** E.R. doctors were lauded as heroes during the early days of COVID − but have since become <u>symbols of professional</u> <u>burnout</u>.
