Equitable Data...

- Allow for rigorous assessment of the extent to which **government programs and policies** yield consistently fair, just, and impartial treatment of all individuals
- Illuminate **opportunities for targeted actions** that will result in demonstrably improved outcomes for underserved communities



Recommendations of the Equitable Data Working Group

- 1. Make disaggregated data the norm while protecting privacy
- 2. Catalyze existing federal infrastructure to leverage underused data
- 3. Build capacity for robust equity assessment for policymaking and program implementation
- **4. Galvanize diverse partnerships** across levels of government and the research community
- 5. **Be Accountable** to the American Public

Disability Data IWG (DDIWG)

From the Equitable Data Working Group Progress Report:

"The SED will begin building comparable best practices for other high-priority under-collected demographic variables, including **disability**...As the work matures, the SED will likely **create additional IWGs** and assign specific deliverables to advance equitable data for other populations under-represented in federal datasets."



DDIWG Purpose and Scope

To coordinate activities to strengthen the federal government's use of disability data to advance equity for people with disabilities

Within the broader scope of equitable data, this work will allow for rigorous assessment of the extent to which government programs and policies yield consistently fair, just, and impartial treatment of people with disabilities



DDIWG Functions

Facilitate **effective and meaningful community engagement** to identify barriers to and opportunities for using federal data to advance equity for people with disabilities

Identify existing **federal disability data resources** and support agencies in optimizing, improving, and increasing those resources

Create a **Federal Evidence Agenda** on Disability Equity



Federal Evidence Agenda on Disability Equity

What evidence-building questions do we, as a Federal Government, need to answer in order to advance equity for people with disabilities?

What evidence gaps are there?

- **Prevalence** (i.e., are we collecting the data needed to count people?)
- **Disparities** (i.e., are we analyzing the data we have to understand where disparities exist and what they are?)
- **Effectiveness** (i.e., for areas where disparities exist, to what extent do we have evidence on effective strategies to address the disparities?)



Federal Evidence Agenda on Disability Equity (cont'd)

- Describe disparities faced by individuals with disabilities that could be better understood through Federal statistics and data collection
- Identify Federal data collections where improved disability data collection may be important for advancing the Federal Government's ability to measure disparities facing individuals with disabilities
- Identify practices for all Federal agencies engaging in disability data collection to follow in order to safeguard privacy, security, and civil rights

Overview of the Request for Information

What is a Request for Information (RFI)?

- A mechanism that Federal agencies use to gather information from experts and interested parties. This tool is used when Federal agencies want to:
 - Inform decision-making
 - Shape policies
 - Foster collaboration
 - Ensure transparency
 - Promote public awareness and education on scientific matters

Purpose of this RFI

- Obtain input from the public to help inform the development of the Federal Evidence Agenda on Disability Equity
 - Describe disparities faced by individuals with disabilities that could be better understood through Federal statistics and data collection
 - Identify Federal data collections where improved disability data collection may be important for advancing the Federal Government's ability to measure disparities facing individuals with disabilities
 - Identify practices for all Federal agencies engaging in disability data collection to follow in order to safeguard privacy, security, and civil rights

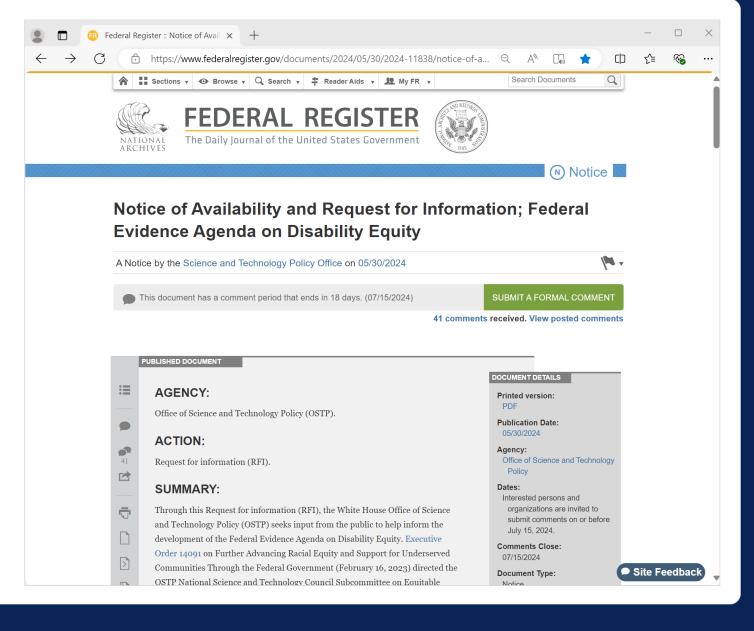


Submitting and Viewing Comments

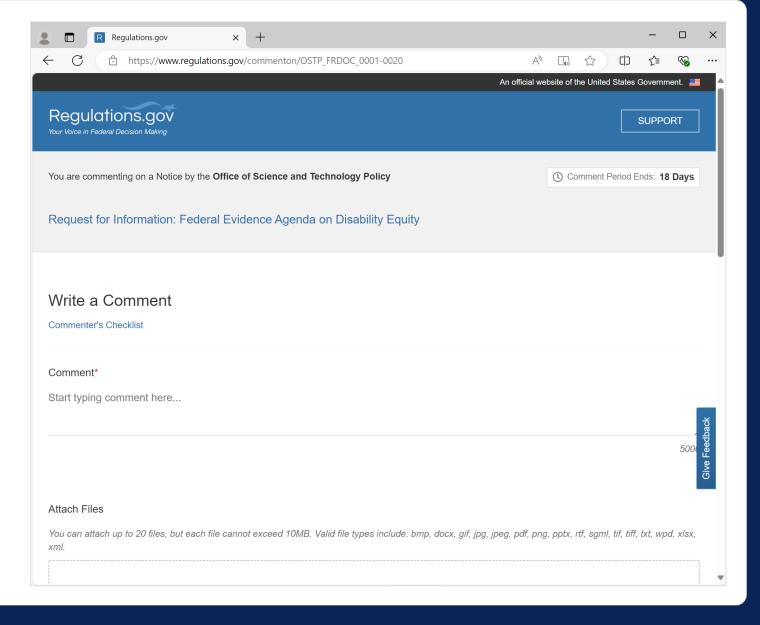

RFI Commenter's Checklist

- Available at Regulations.gov
- Provides important background information and tips for submitting effective comments
 - Many in the public mistakenly believe that their submitted form letter constitutes a "vote" regarding the issues concerning them. Although public support or opposition may help guide important public policies, agencies make determinations for a proposed action based on sound reasoning and scientific evidence rather than a majority of votes. A single, well-supported comment may carry more weight than a thousand form letters.



Important Instructions and Considerations

- In your submission, do not include any copyrighted material; information of a confidential nature, such as personal or proprietary information; or any information you would not like to be made publicly available. By submitting a comment, you agree to the terms of participation and privacy notice.
- OSTP will not respond to individual submissions. A response to this RFI will not be viewed as a binding commitment to develop or pursue the project or ideas discussed. This RFI is not accepting applications for financial assistance or financial incentives.



Important Instructions and Considerations (continued)

- Responses containing references, studies, research, and other empirical data that are not widely published should include copies of or electronic links to the referenced materials. Responses from minors, or responses containing profanity, vulgarity, threats, or other inappropriate language or content will not be considered.
- Comments submitted to the RFI are subject to the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA).

Describing Disparities

- What disparities faced by individuals with disabilities are not well-understood through existing Federal statistics and data collection?
- What types of community-based or non-Federal statistics or data collections could help inform the creation of the Federal Evidence Agenda on Disability Equity?
- Individuals with disabilities experience disparities in a broad range of areas. What factors or criteria should the DDIWG consider when considering policy research priorities?



Informing Data Collections and Public Access

- Disability can be defined and measured in multiple ways. What frameworks for defining and measuring disability or specific considerations should the DDIWG be aware of?
- What barriers may individuals with disabilities face when it comes to participating in surveys or filling out administrative forms?
- Which practices employed by Federal agencies facilitate access to and use of Federal survey and administrative data? Are there additional practices that would be beneficial?



Privacy, Security, and Civil Rights

- What privacy, confidentiality, and civil rights considerations should the Federal government take into account when expanding its collection, use, and sharing of disaggregated disability data?
- What considerations are unique to the disability community or are experienced differently by individuals with disabilities?
