Medicaid & Peer Support | Talking Points

- Medicaid is critical to helping people with mental health conditions, and roughly <u>40 percent</u> of people on Medicaid have a mental health or substance use condition.
- Medicaid pays for vital services that people with mental health conditions rely on, such as medications, psychotherapy, intensive and inpatient treatment, peer support, and crisis care.
- Peer support services are <u>effective</u> and cost-efficient. Medicaid provides an important option for states to support and sustainably finance peer support services.
 - In 2007, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) released a <u>State</u> <u>Medicaid Director Letter</u> (SMDL) providing guidance to states interested in peer support services under the Medicaid program.
 - To <u>qualify</u> for Medicaid reimbursement, peer support workers must fulfill a number of requirements, including completing training and certification as determined by the state.
 - Given the variability among state Medicaid programs, peer support services vary significantly across Medicaid programs in terms of certification requirements, reimbursement rates, and supervision requirements. Most state Medicaid programs reimburse peer support in 15-minute service intervals.
- As of 2023, <u>48 states</u> reimburse for peer support services for mental health and substance use disorders and have developed peer support certification to meet Medicaid standards for qualifications and training.
- Changes in Medicaid financing structure could result in people with mental health conditions losing their coverage or access to some services and benefits that are <u>optional</u> for states to cover, such as peer support services.
