

- Variable access to health services, especially specialty services.




Reaching Rural Audiences


- Before the grant or research proposal, before the institutional review board approval, before
 defining your methods: Define whom this work is intended to serve and whether this work matters
 to them.
- Engage "rural" before you engage in research.
- Conduct research that matters to your intended audience, and establish reciprocity and engagement in the earliest stages of research.
- Is this topic new, does it matter to rural audiences, and/or is it redundant?



SIZE

How large is the community and how large is the geography?

RURAL ADJACENT

What is the size of the adjacent community or distance to urban areas?

DEMOGRAPHIC

What is the racial, age, ethnic, economic, and educational variability in the community?

INDUSTRY

Recognize primary industry and sources of information in community

TRUSTED SOURCES

Understand who trusted sources are in each community, and where people turn to for advice







SUMMARY

To effectively share information in rural communities, use trusted local networks such as churches, schools, and community organizations to ensure credibility and engagement. Combine traditional media (radio, newspapers, bulletin boards) with digital tools (Facebook groups) to reach diverse audiences. Tailor messages to be clear, visual, and accessible, using in-person meetings, storytelling, and mailed materials to accommodate varying literacy levels and internet access.
