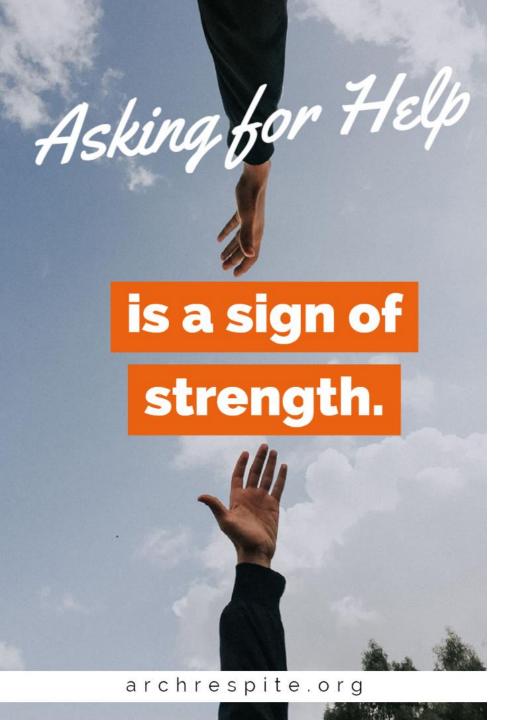

Respite is...

Planned or emergency care provided to a child or adult with special needs in order to provide temporary relief to family caregivers who are caring for that child or adult.

Lifespan Respite Care Act definition PL 109-442

 - Home care agencies
 - Adult Day Services
 - Facility-based
 - Community-based programs
- Informal Services
 - Family and Friends
 - Volunteer or Faith-based

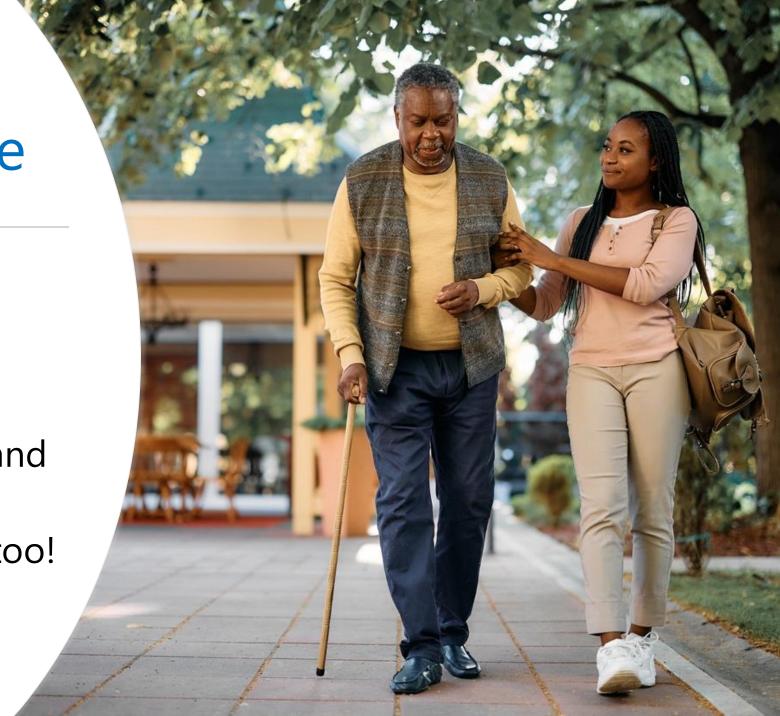

Benefits of Respite

- Reduces Stress
- Improves physical and emotional health
- Enhances relationships and reduces social isolation
- Care recipients benefit, too!









Respite: Too Little, Too Late

- Overall, 87% of family caregivers are not receiving respite services.
- Respite underutilized and/or delayed among caregivers of persons with dementia.
- Of those who use respite, they often receive too little, too late.
- Why? Barriers are pervasive.

Public & Private Funding Sources

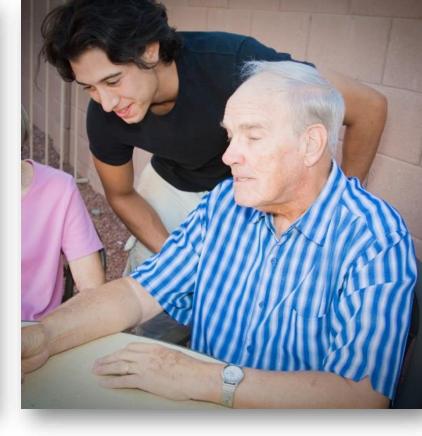
- Federal Medicaid Waivers, National Family Caregiver Support Program, Veterans Programs, new GUIDE Medicare payment model, Center for Dementia Respite Innovation
- State Funded Respite Programs
- Private Aging organizations, HFC Scholarships, Free Volunteer or Faithbased services
- Self-pay, sliding fee, self-pay or longterm care insurance











Lifespan Respite Care Program Definition: Coordinated **SYSTEMS** of accessible, community-based respite services for family caregivers regardless of age or special need of the care recipient.

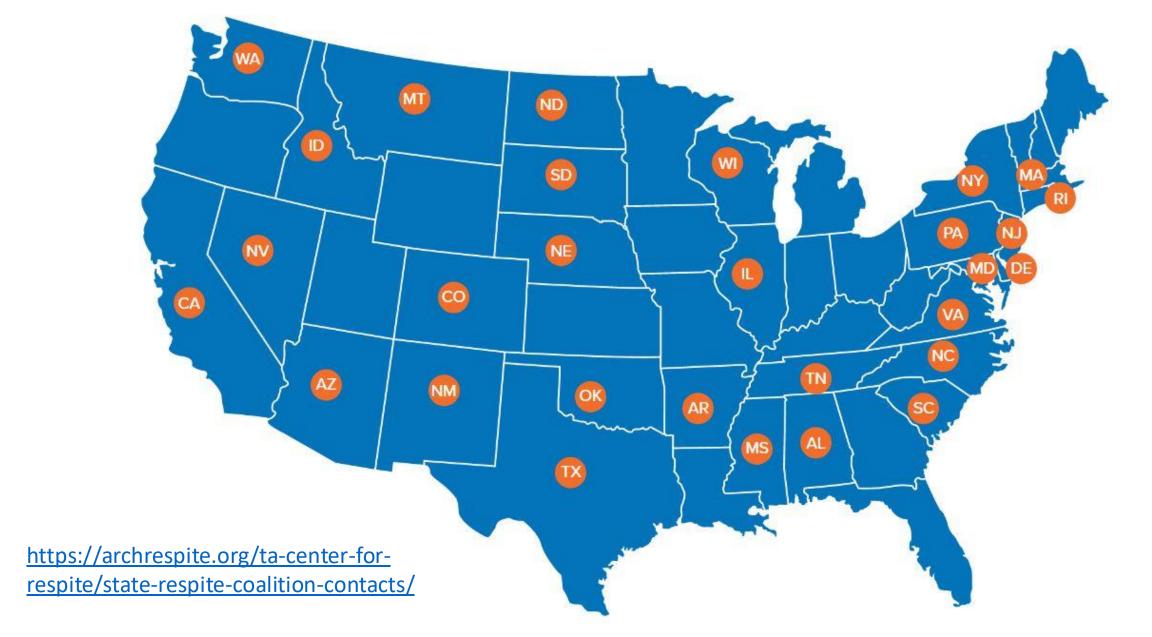

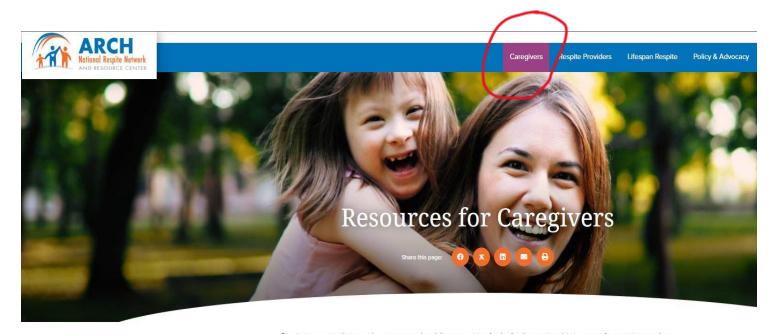

Respite is a service that provides a temporary break from caregiving for the family caregiver. It is important for caregivers to plan ahead if possible when they begin their caregiving activities to access intermittent breaks from caregiving. To be most effective, you should consider respite services much earlier than you think you will need them. Respite will be most helpful if you use it before you become exhausted, isolated, and overwhelmed by your responsibilities. Respite services can be beneficial, meaningful, and enjoyable to both the caregiver and the care recipient.
